What Is 4-H?

I pledge my head to clearer thinking, my heart to greater loyalty, my hand to larger service, my health to better living, for my club, my community, my country, and my world. This is the 4-H pledge which was written in 1927.

4-H stands for the four h's — head, heart, hands, and health. The 4-H emblem is a four leaf clover. Each leaf on the clover stands for one of the four h's. The emblem was adopted in 1911.

4-H participants get to sign up for projects to take to the county fair and make them. Then during the county fair they get to take the projects they've made to the fair grounds and the get their projects judged.
