The University of Wisconsin-Extension has created and adapted tools and approaches to help communities identify opportunities that improve quality of life. In this session, members of Extension's Community Vitality & Placemaking Signature Effort will provide training in the following tools/approaches:

- First Impressions: Assessing a community's "first impression" using a secret-shopper approach.
- Business Walk: A face-to-face Business Retention & Expansion program that celebrates local businesses while strengthening relationships.
- Imageability Mapping: Identifying the "bones of community" to help identify strategic opportunities for local investment.
- Capital Asset Inventory: A fun input to asset based community development organized around community capitals.
- S.W.O.T.(C.) Mapping: Creating interactive maps that allow community members to identify local strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats/challenges.
- Community Placemaking Assessment Mapping: Identifying local placemaking principles while contributing to a global community of case studies.

Participants will receive a quick overview of each of the elements above followed by direct training with expert facilitators. Participants will be encouraged to interrupt presenters with questions as they play with the tools and training materials.

Using and Analyzing Qualitative Data

Qualitative data can help us gain a rich, deep understanding of a topic and qualitative data collection can allow a participant to share stories, context, and descriptions. Come and work with real Extension data and learn about how to analyze data as a group, code, identify themes, and communicate your findings to others. Real world, Extension-generated data will be gathered from registrants ahead of time so that we can analyze one of our project's data together. We will learn the value of including people with different perspectives in analysis, starting with a pre-defined coding structure versus creating your coding structure from the ground-up, and cleaning up codes. In terms of using the results, we will review and discuss different styles of reporting out findings from qualitative data projects. We will discuss different scenarios where we gather qualitative data in Extension, discuss common challenges and brainstorm solutions together. We will learn about organizing and analyzing data using Excel and MAXQDA software. Feel free to come if you are a beginner or if you have some experience... if you have some experience, you may pick up a few tips & tricks and can also share your expertise with colleagues.

Then, and perhaps more importantly, you will learn how to run your own stats using a free no-code tool and create quality graphs to communicate your results.

Safe Icebreakers: Fostering Connection Without the Risk

This session will explore the crucial role of icebreakers in fostering connection at events while prioritizing participant comfort, neurodiversity, and psychological safety. Traditional icebreakers often rely on personal disclosures, potentially triggering discomfort or unease in attendees, especially when interacting with strangers. This session will address the potential pitfalls of such activities and offer practical alternatives.

We will examine common triggers, including noisy and chaotic environments, pressure to reveal personal information, being put on the spot, and physical contact. Participants will learn how these factors can create barriers to engagement rather than fostering connection.

The session will then delve into a toolkit of safe and effective icebreakers. These activities will focus on shared experiences, lighthearted interactions, and collaborative tasks, avoiding the need for potentially sensitive personal revelations. Examples will include quick polls, word association games, and small group problem-solving challenges. We will also discuss strategies for adapting icebreakers to different group sizes and event formats.

Attendees will leave this session equipped with the knowledge and resources to create welcoming and inclusive environments, ensuring that icebreakers serve their intended purpose: building rapport and encouraging meaningful interaction without compromising individual comfort or well-being. This session is ideal for all JCEP attendees from any institute, and it directly addresses the JCEP objectives by providing new skills and knowledge related to addressing a relevant problem and improving program effectiveness.
